Christmas is indeed about making memories, particularly for children who carry the sights, smells and tastes of that day with them into adulthood. Dr. Daniel and Jeannean Verburg's five children know that first-hand, with a mom who loves decorating for the holidays around the calendar, from St. Patrick's Day to Halloween. And you should see what she pulls out for Christmas.
